




Our committee members are always happy and willing to answer any questions that you may have regarding studying at King's. Please feel free to contact any of them if you ever need help!



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
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# Upcoming Events

Come down for 2 days of great fun and games! This will be a great opportunity for all freshers to meet fellow freshers and seniors and make some new friends before flying to London!


## Warwick Summer Games



# Visa Application

You should only apply for your Visa once King's has issued you with a **Confirmation of Acceptance for Studies (CAS)** number and information regarding relevant documents you need when you apply for your Visa. Make sure there are no mistakes because it's a pain to get them to change it. After your confirmation of acceptance into King's, you have to request for your CAS number on the King's application portal. The CAS may take ages, so please chase them early if you need to. You should receive your CAS number at most in a month. After that, it's worth calling the administrative office.

When applying for your Student Visa, you will be applying as a general student under **Tier 4 (General) Students**. King's has been listed as Highly Trusted under a list of registered sponsors and thus the process to apply for a visa will be more streamlined and convenient.

## Process

- Visit <https://www.gov.uk/apply-uk-visa> to begin your online application for the Student Visa.
- You will need to complete 2 forms:
  - a. Online Application form VAF –PBS Migrant (Point Based System Form)
  - b. Tier 4: PBS Appendix 8 (General) Student
- These forms will have to be downloaded and printed and will be required as part of your supporting documents.
- Applicants require a total of 40 points to be eligible for a visa. Obtaining a CAS from KCL will gain you 30 points. Proof of maintenance will gain you the remaining 10 points.
- King's is listed as a highly trusted sponsor and all KCL offer holders, who are Singaporean or British, will be considered a low-risk applicant and will not need to provide proof of maintenance. (A list of nationalities considered low risk can be found on their website.)

# Visa Application

## Preparing Your Documents

### CAS

You will need to write your CAS reference number in your Visa application. King's will provide you with your CAS reference number. Again, definitely chase them if you have yet to get it after a month of requesting.

You will need to know what evidence King's has included on your CAS so that you can include it in your Visa application. Generally, the only evidence you need to show will be your academic transcripts (A Levels, IB or Diploma). When applying for your Visa, please bring the original copies of your academic transcripts or certificates but be mindful to bring along a photocopied version as well. You will not get these documents back.

There will be additional requirements or evidence if you are applying to study a course that requires an ATAS clearance certificate, or if you are a postgraduate doctor or dentist. If these documents apply to you, you will be notified by King's once your CAS reference number has been issued.

### **Evidence of Ability to Fund (Proof of Maintenance)**

This refers to your ability to pay for course fees and living costs (~1000 pounds per month), shown with a bank statement and a letter from parents if the bank account is theirs. If you are considered a 'low risk' national by the UK Visas and Immigration (UKVI) (Singaporean is considered a low-risk national), you do not need to show evidence of your money to cover your course fees and living costs. However, you must confirm on your application form that you meet the requirements set out financially and that you hold the required documents. UKVI reserves the right to request any or all of these documents and your application will be refused if you do not provide them.

If you do not fall under the category of 'low risk', you must show evidence that you are receiving official financial sponsorship and/or have enough money to cover your remaining course fees and living costs.

# Visa Application

## Documents to bring:

- Visa Appointment Letter
- Passports (and all previous passports as declared on the application form). You should make sure that the **expiry date of your passport covers all three or more years** of your education at King's. If your passport expires halfway while you are in the UK you may have to reapply a new visa for your new passport and this will be both expensive and troublesome. It should not be a problem once you receive your Biometric Residential Permit (BRP) in London, but it's a good idea to be safe (especially since the BRP is just a card that can be easily lost, whereas your Visa is attached to your passport).
- 2 passport sized colour photos (Bring 3 to be safe) - On the back of each photograph, write the full name of the person in the photograph.
- Printed completed copies of both forms as mentioned above.
- NRIC
- CAS Number
- Your Academic Transcripts and Bank Statement. Those under scholarships can request a proof of funding from their organizations.
- All appointments will be at the UK Visa Application Office (details on next page)

## Visa Appointment:

- You must make an appointment online via [www.vfs-uk-sg.com](http://www.vfs-uk-sg.com) before you head down to the visa application. No walk-in appointments.
- At the centre, you will submit your completed forms and supporting documents, pay the visa fees, record your fingerprints and take a photo.
- Do note that your passport will have to be submitted and sent to Manila where the visa will be processed, along with your original documents. So make sure that you do not plan to travel after you've submitted your passport. (If you require to hold on to your passport, there is a 'keep my passport' option available for an additional price).
- Most applications take 10 working days to be processed, and you can pay for priority services to speed up the process. However, give a larger window of time just in case complications arise.

## Miscellaneous Advice

- UKVI changes their policies frequently, even mid-way through a batch of visa applications. It is not guaranteed that the policies remain the same for all who apply for a student visa for school entry in 2019. Please do check the UKVI website or VFS website frequently for the latest updates.
- If your passport is expiring soon, renew it before applying for the visa. The visa is just a sticker on your passport. Upon expiry of your passport, you will have to carry both your old and new passport. It is also expensive to transfer the visa to another passport. You may need a new CAS number as it is tied to the passport number. Do change your passport early if necessary.
- There are premium services offered at varying prices if you want special arrangements made such as keeping your passport or original documents. Such services and prices can be found on [www.vfsglobal.co.uk/sg/en/premium-services](http://www.vfsglobal.co.uk/sg/en/premium-services).

## If your visa hasn't arrived yet and you're panicking...

- Avoid calling the UKVI number/emailing UKVI as it is very expensive and not particularly helpful since they are held by many confidentiality constraints. In most cases, the only information they can give you is whether your visa application has been reviewed yet or not, not even if it was successful.
- Check with others to see if they are having the same problem. There have been delays in the past, and checking with others may help you figure out if this is a more individualised issue.
- Try going down to VFS to collect it anyway. Many freshers did this last year even though they had not received a text yet and their visas were there. It is worth the effort to check, even if it may not be ready.

# Visa Application

## **If all else fails and your flight cannot be postponed:**

- Your best bet is to get a temporary travel document from ICA. You should bring a passport-sized photo along as well. This should get you to the UK, but you will still need your passport to eventually be sent/mailed to you from Singapore as the temporary travel document only lasts a few months. In addition, you still will not know if your visa has been approved yet, so postponing your flight is still the safest option if you have not gotten your visa.

# Exit Permit (NSmen)

All operationally ready NSmen are required to get an exit permit online via <http://www.ns.sg>. You can get this for the full duration of your course.

A notification will be sent after your application. Your application should be approved immediately, although random checks might be conducted to validate your evidence of overseas education.

Apply early as checks will take approximately 3 weeks if you are randomly selected to submit evidence of your overseas studies.

For pre-enlisted or disrupted servicemen, check with CMPB or MINDEF for details. Call the 24-hour NS Call Centre at 1800-367 6767 if you have any queries.

# Medical Coverage and Insurance

We recommend going for a medical check-up at Tan Tock Seng Hospital's Travellers' Health and Vaccination Clinic (TTSH THVC) or any private clinic and ask for a **medical report**. This should include a chest X-ray as the customs officers may ask to look at it. Inform the nurses that you are a student going to the UK.

As an international student studying at King's, you can receive **NHS medical care**, provided by local doctors on the same basis as UK nationals. NHS treatment is free as you would have paid for the immigration health surcharge together with your Visa. However, prescriptions as well as dental and optical treatments are chargeable. You can get vaccinations for free with the Health Centre! Register with a GP in London by filling out a form online, or look out for the KCL NHS Health Centre booth during Freshers' Week.

Not all medication will be available or advised in the same way in the UK as in Singapore. You should therefore bring copies of your medical records if you wish to obtain prescribed medication or you should bring an adequate supply of medication to cover the time while you are in London. You are highly advised to purchase your own medical insurance. Some options that are popular among students include AIA, NTUC income and AIG Student Assist, which have policies specific to overseas students.

We also strongly advise you to purchase personal possessions insurance to cover you against loss or damage to your personal items, not to mention travel insurance. This should cover you even when you travel out of the UK.

If you are unsure of your insurance options, we work with professionals from Cresco Insurance Agency whom you can contact to for advice on your insurance plan!

# Budgeting

A ballpark figure of an average student's expenditure per month on general activities (excluding accommodation and key initial expenses) ranges from **£400-£1000**, depending on lifestyle.

## Common Expenses

- Public Transport: £50-100 per month
- Groceries: £80-160 per month
- Eating Out: £7-20 per meal

Do also remember to bring enough money for the first one to two months here if you are intending to transfer money over from Singapore to your new bank account, or if you have brought a bank draft for your expenditure in Uni instead.

Debit cards normally take about 7 working days to be processed and delivered, assuming nothing goes wrong, so you would want to have at least one week's worth of expenditure in cash set aside if you've already set up your bank account in the UK.

# Opening A Bank Account (SG)

You will need to set up an Advance or Premier account with **HSBC** (not possible through other banks). As HSBC is an international bank, it is subject to regulations which change from time to time, hence it would be wise to call them up to check the requirements and conditions.

After setting up the account, request the Singapore Branch to set up a NORMAL London account remotely at no extra cost. This process can take up to a couple of months, so it is best to do it as early as possible.

Finally, have the London debit card and account details sent to you in Singapore.

Premier Account holders will automatically have worldwide Premier status.

## PROS

- You will not have to worry about setting up an account in London and will be able to use your debit card upon arrival.
- You will not have to bring a large sum of cash when entering London (problem can also be avoided using Youtrip/DBS multicurrency - See Opening a Bank Account (UK))

## CONS

- There are certain requirements that have to be met before an account can be opened. For instance, Advance accounts require a minimum deposit of SGD30,000 and Premier accounts SGD200,000. You will also have to maintain a certain amount in the account at all times. Please check with the bank itself for the detailed terms and conditions.
- It takes a while for the bank to process accounts remotely and the process of communication with the bank to setup the account can be quite troublesome. So the entire process may get very tedious and long. As such, please make sure to cater ample time for the whole process if you choose this option.

# DBS Check

**The Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) Check will only need to be done by students who are studying courses that involve clinical placements eg. Medicine, Dentistry, Nursing.**

The DBS check is required as these courses involve students coming into regular contact with potentially vulnerable members of the public.

## Application Process

The application process starts while you are still in Singapore. King's would email you to register online to start the application process. You are required to scan and submit your Certificate of Clearance (COC) and pay the application fee before you arrive in the UK.

When you are in the UK, you are required to attend one of the DBS check sessions to validate the remaining supporting documents.

Once your application is approved, a certificate will be sent to your address.

## Supporting Documents

- Certificate of Clearance. You would need to apply to Singapore Police Force to obtain this document. More information can be found at [www.police.gov.sg/e-services/apply/certificate-of-clearance](http://www.police.gov.sg/e-services/apply/certificate-of-clearance)
- Passport
- Biometric Residence Permit
- A document that verifies your UK address. Note that the Confirmation of Study Letter, which you will collect from King's upon arrival in the UK, cannot be used for this. Most students will use a bank statement that includes your UK address.

If you are unable to obtain your bank statement before the DBS check session (which is quite possible - see 'Opening a Bank Account (UK)'), then please contact your faculty directly to inform them of your situation and they will arrange to help you still get your DBS.

# Packing For London

## General Tips For Packing!

- You should be able to find most of the things you need in London, albeit at a more expensive price.
- Remember to confirm your baggage allowance! Check with your airline if necessary.
- If you have differently shaped goods you would like to bring (sporting goods: floorball/golf sticks, and/or large musical instruments), check with your airline if there are extra costs for these. Remember to get the airline staff to label these check-in items as fragile!
- Some airlines give allowance if you let them know beforehand that you are a student moving overseas for studies.

## Clothing & Footwear

- Make sure you have adequate clothing for every season.
- You are advised to buy your winter clothing (esp. winter coat(s)) in London as the selection is wider and cheaper.
- It is generally quite windy and wet in London, hence it would be good to have a pair of waterproof shoes/boots and a waterproof windbreaker/bomber jacket.
- A sturdy umbrella is recommended for some of the wetter days in London
- As the weather in London can get erratic, it is best to layer your clothing. Thermal underwear is generally unnecessary but is dependent on the individual. Uniqlo's Heat-tech line is very useful and affordable. Plus, they're thin and hence easier to pack.
- You should bring at least one set of formal wear for balls/formal dinners/networking events (depending on your course), i.e. Suit, tie, formal dress, dress shoes etc.
- Most sports apparels and equipment can be bought at reasonable prices at sports shops such as Lilywhites, Decathlon, and Sports Direct. Primark is decent too.
- When you first arrive in London in September, the weather should be quite comfortable (10-16 degrees Celsius). You are however advised to bring along a light jacket, to allow your body to comfortably adapt to the change in climate. This will also help you avoid the dreaded Fresher's Flu.

# Packing For London

- **It is highly recommended to bring your own medication.** It's awfully common to feel under the weather within your first month in London. Best be medically prepared especially when you are not yet familiar with the NHS system.

## Things to put in your hand carry luggage for when you fly

- Passport (with valid visa)
- Confirmation of Acceptance for Studies (CAS) letter from King's College London
- Offer Letter from King's College London
- Address to your accommodation & directions to get there
- Medical Report with Chest X-Ray (optional)
- Financial Statements (for non 'low-risk' applicants)
- Proof of Scholarship/Scholarship contract (for those under scholarship)
- Cash/Traveller's Cheque
- Emergency Contact details
- Laptop

**It's best to try to fit all the paper documents together in a single A4 file/plastic folder**

## Essentials

- Singpass OneKey Token (allow for Singpass login without using your Singapore mobile number)
- iBanking Tokens
- Prescribed Medication
- Recent Passport Photos

## Miscellaneous

- Most Kings Accommodations do not provide pillows, duvets and sheets but they can be bought for a reasonable price in Primark, John Lewis, IKEA, etc in London. If your bed is a super single, you can consider getting sheets for a double bed instead as it is quite difficult to find super single sheets.
- Bolsters are a rarity in London.

# Packing For London

- Chinese herbs/TCM are very expensive in London (and quite troublesome to source for) so do pack some if you prefer to rely on them.
- Contact lenses and contact lens solutions are expensive in London so you should bring a year's supply to tide you through the academic year.

## FAQ

### Can I bring my sports/musical instruments?

- Answered above. Do ensure they are kept in a hard case too.
- Alternatively, certain airlines (e.g. Singapore Airlines) require you to purchase an extra seat to accommodate it. The musical instrument will be placed on the floor and properly secured by seat belts to the seat frame.
- Double Bass is not allowed onboard as it exceeds the height limit set.

### Should I buy my textbooks in Singapore?

- You are strongly discouraged from buying your textbooks before going over to London. This is because your lecturers might advise you on the particular type of textbook to use as part of the course curriculum.
- Also, it is likely to be cheaper in London as you have more options of buying from Amazon, second-hand bookshops or your seniors. And, books are heavy.
- Digital copies can be easily sourced for with the right knowledge. Your seniors might be able to help in this department.
- Additionally, lecturers provide access to digitized versions of textbooks and readings, and textbooks/class material can also be found in the school library.

### Should I bring stationery over?

- Stock up on stationery in Singapore as they are **much** cheaper here (pens, pencils, highlighters, foolscap pads, rulers, erasers, hole punchers, staplers & staples).
- If your course requires a calculator, buy it only after your course has recommended a specific model/type (the Singapore standard issue Casio fx-95SG PLUS model might not be allowed for use in exams by the school depending on the department; they use the fx-83/85 GT PLUS iteration instead).

# Packing For London

- You need not bring bulky items like files and folders as they can be bought from stationers like Ryman's, which offers a 10% student discount.

## **Can I bring a rice cooker?**

- You may wish to pack a small rice cooker especially if your accommodation is non-catered. Note that you are usually prohibited from having high energy electrical appliances like kettles, portable heaters or hair dryers in your rooms. However, the halls are not very stringent in enforcing these rules as long as they are kept out of sight when they conduct occasional checks of your room.
- Do check if your accommodation's kitchen has stoves/hobs for cooking as some catered halls do not have stoves for cooking but only a microwave and a fridge (e.g. International Hall). In general, most electronics and kitchen equipment/utensils can be easily purchased at reasonable prices at places like Argos.

## **Can I get my Milo/SG food fix in London?**

- Yes, there are restaurants such as Roti King and Rasa sayang that serve up authentic South-East Asian cuisine that will remind you of home.
- You may want to bring some instant drinks like Milo or herbal/chrysanthemum tea (Milo is quite rare and expensive).
- The Chinese supermarkets in Leicester Square have some of the brands of popular beverages and snacks in Singapore such as Yeo's, Vitasoy and Meiji. These Chinese supermarkets even have Prima Taste pastes but will cost more.
- If you're lucky, your accommodation might be near an Asian Supermarket too, like Longdan in Elephant & Castle.

# Accommodations

All first year students are guaranteed accommodation from King's (if applied before the guarantee deadline of 31 May 2019). If allocated a room that is not ideal, you can either:

1. Email the King's College accommodation team at **bookings@kcl.ac.uk** with three preferred options for accommodation specifying the room type wanted.
2. Swap rooms with another student in October, usually by posting on the respective accommodation's Facebook page about looking to swap.

If King's does not assign you an accommodation, you should call their accommodation hotline to chase them/appeal to them to assign you one (but they may assign you a place you did not apply for). If this does not work, you can either turn to private student accommodations or rent privately.

## Private Student Accommodations

These tend to be more expensive than King's Accommodations, and you usually have to sign a longer contract, but you can choose the type of room you want according to your budget. Common private accommodations are **Portchester House, Urbanest, Pure Student Living**, etc. It's worth checking out their websites if you are displeased with your assigned accommodation!

## Renting Privately

**Zoopla** and **Rightmove** are some websites to find a place to rent, but renting privately can be complicated. You may have to find housemates, and the landlord has to be willing to settle the contract online or you will have to come to London early to find a place. But you should be able to find a place that is cheaper than student accommodations. This option is rare for first years, especially for those unfamiliar with London. Ask an Exco member for more advice or details about the process as many second years rent privately!

# Accommodations

## King's Accommodations

All accommodations have 24hr security, free wi-fi, and shared kitchens (unless they are studios/catered). Find travel times from the accommodation to each campus on the King's Accommodations website (these tend to be underestimated - double check with Google Maps/Citymapper).

Note that undergraduates can still stay in accommodations listed as postgraduate (e.g. tower bridge), just that these accommodations will be majority postgraduate.

The intercollegiate halls are not exclusive to King's students and will be tenanted by students from other universities as well.

In the next page, we have compiled a short summary of the King's accommodations.



# Arriving At The Airport

It might be overwhelming when you first land at Heathrow, especially if you are coming alone. But don't worry! The immigration process is pretty much the same as clearing immigration for any other trips you've been on, just with certain additional steps.

Although Heathrow has recently introduced ePassport gates for Singaporean nationals, you will need to see an immigration officer to present all your documents and get your passport stamped for the first time you arrive in London with your student Visa.

Do check with staff at the terminal to confirm which immigration queue to join or if there is a priority student queue available (parents are allowed to join this queue too).

Upon reaching the immigration desk, the immigration officer will ask for the following documents (sometimes the officer might not ask for all of them, but do have them just in case)

1. Passport (with valid visa)
2. Letter from UKBA (you will receive this when you collect your passport and visa)
3. Immigration card (you can pick this up while in the queue and fill it up then)
4. Confirmation of Acceptance for Studies (CAS) letter from King's College London (AS12N)
5. Offer Letter from King's College London
6. Medical Report with Chest X-Ray (unlikely to be needed)
7. Financial Statements for non 'low-risk' applicants (unlikely to be needed)
8. Proof of Scholarship/Scholarship contract for those under scholarship (unlikely to be needed)

You should be done following checks and you can be on your way to London!

# Getting To Central London

## *From Heathrow*

**Option 1: Airport Transfers** (Most convenient & comfortable but also most expensive option)

Airport taxis are available 24/7. **Don't take black cabs.** It's a lot cheaper to book a licensed minicab beforehand in Singapore. The drivers will usually receive you at the arrival lobby with your name on a piece of paper. Note that such services must be pre-booked. Journey time is approximately 40 minutes, but depending on traffic conditions, and during peak hours 7-9am and 5-7pm, it may take up to 60 minutes.

**Option 2: Express Trains** (Fastest, quite expensive, indirect journey)

These are two different express trains that go directly to Central London from Heathrow. Both depart from Heathrow and end at London Paddington Station:

1. *Heathrow Express*: it is the fastest way to get from Heathrow to Central London. It is a direct train which only stops at London Paddington and it takes only 15 minutes. Depending on how far in advance you book, the prices differ. Refer to [www.heathrowexpress.com](http://www.heathrowexpress.com) for more information.

2. *TfL Rail Services* (Formerly Heathrow Connect): This is a 30 minute train that also goes from Heathrow to London Paddington Station, which runs every 30 mins. It is generally cheaper than the Heathrow Express (£10.30 for an adult ticket).

Note that there is a 50% discount for all children aged 5-15, and ISIC cardholders get 25% off the Heathrow Express. Refer to <https://www.isic.org/> for more details.

Despite the convenience of taking these trains to reach Central London, you should bear in mind that you will still have to take further transport from Paddington in order to get to your accommodation.

## Option 3: London Tube (slowest but cheapest)

London Heathrow sits on the Piccadilly Line (Dark blue). In order to take the Tube, you will need to purchase an **Oyster Card** (transport card) from the ticket office or the Automated Machine (at the station) and pay a deposit of £5, plus your trip fare (we recommend topping up an extra £10). **There is NO phone/data service in the underground sections of the tube.** As such, do download the London Underground map into your phone beforehand, so you have easy access while travelling via rail. Do check [www.tfl.gov.uk](http://www.tfl.gov.uk), service announcement boards or ask Tube staff to make sure that the line you want to take is in working order, particularly if you're travelling on the weekend.

Most college halls are about an hour away from Heathrow via tube. If you're handling two pieces of luggage, be careful, as the tube carriages are tiny and not all Tube Stations have step-free access (i.e. Lifts). # Getting Around London

## London Underground (Tube)

The London Underground isn't cheap, but it's the best way of getting around town. King's 3 main campuses are right in front of Temple (Strand Campus), Waterloo (Waterloo Campus) and London Bridge (Guy's Campus). On Friday and Saturday nights, some lines run for the whole night (Night Tube). Grab a tube map from any tube station or download the Tube Map app from the app store. Tube fares are £2.40 per journey within Zone 1. All fares can be found at the TfL website.




## Bus

Buses cost £1.50 per trip (transfer buses for free for an hour), and often can be a much more direct method of getting around as opposed to the Tube. Unlike in Singapore, there is no need to tap out. What's more, there are usually night buses that run throughout the night, even after the Tube closes, which is a cheaper alternative to Uber and taxis after a night out



## Paying for Public Transport

This is mostly done through **Oyster Cards** or **contactless bank cards**. For those who travel a lot, it is advisable to get the **weekly or monthly travel passes**. Order an **18+ Student Oyster Card** and get 30% off the price of the passes. Do note that this discount is only for the travel passes, and do not apply to single trips.



Another option is purchasing a **16-25 Rail Card** (£30 a year or £70 for 3 years). The railcard gives a 30% discount on National Rail travel and it is useful when you travel within the UK. The Railcard can be linked to your Oyster card to save 1/3 off tube fares during off-peak hours. All you need to do is bring your Oyster card and valid Railcard to a Tube station ticket office and ask for them to be linked up.



# Getting Around London

## Bicycle

Make use of the Santander bikes (£2/24 hours) scattered around London or buy your own bike to travel conveniently around. Cycling is generally cheaper than making use of public transport daily with reasonable bikes and locks ranging from £70-£200. Make sure you're confident enough to ride a bike though, because the streets of London are hell to ride in. Invest in a strong lock (with wires or solid steel chains) and make sure you know how to secure your bike like a pro. People have a tendency to steal the wheels if they can't get the whole bike, so secure those too.



## Walking

Walking to get around London is very common as it saves a lot of money and doubles as exercise. Unlike Singapore's hot and humid weather, London's cool weather is great for walking even the longest distances. It is not uncommon to walk distances of between 30-40 minutes in London (e.g. to get to school daily). Just invest in a nice comfortable pair of shoes to walk in and you're all set to go!



## Cabs/Uber

While expensive, black cabs tend to be reliable and safe. Uber (or other ride-hailing services) tends to be cheaper. You can also use apps like MyTaxi to book a black cab if you cannot find one on the streets.



ViaVan is another notable ride-hailing app that charges just £3 for single person rides within zone 1.

# To Do Upon Arrival

## 1. Register with the Singapore High Commission

Registering with the Singapore High Commission allows the Commission to contact you in order to make sure that you are safe and, if need be, assist you should an emergency (eg natural disasters, civil unrest, etc) occur. You can do so through the Ministry of Foreign Affairs portal online.

## 2. Matriculation

You will get an email from King's to notify you of the items you need to bring for registration for your course and to get your **King's student card** as well as your **Biometric Residence Permit (BRP)**, as well as when you can start doing this. After registering, you should be given an official registration letter from the school (**Confirmation of Studies letter**), with your new address in London on it.

New copies of the Confirmation of Studies letter can be obtained at the Compass, found in every King's library. This letter is required for bank account applications and council tax exemption (for students staying in private accommodations that require you to pay council tax).

Gaining access to some buildings like the Dickson Poon Law School and Waterloo Bridge Wing requires you to activate your student card at a security counter. It is also needed to access school buildings after 6pm and on weekends.

## 3. Registering with a GP

It is always a good idea to register under one that is located near to you in case of any emergencies. Search for a GP near you and register with them (most of them accept online applications).

Alternatively, a GP is present at the Strand Campus in the KCLSU building. Fill in the form given to you and hand it over to the receptionist at the GP. Most King's accommodations have counters to sign up with the GP at the KCLSU building as well.

# Opening A Bank Account (UK)

There are many banks in London to choose from, and the types of student accounts they offer are more or less the same. Do note that given our Visa type, we are only allowed to apply for a Student account. We are usually not entitled to those that require a minimum period of residence in the UK. Read the criteria for the accounts closely (available online via bank website) before applying for them.

Common banks used by students: Lloyds, NatWest, Barclays, Santander, HSBC, TSB

## Choosing a bank

- If possible, do your research online before deciding on a bank. Some banks offer freebies with student accounts (eg NatWest will give you a free National Express Coach Card if you opt for paperless statements with your student account)
- However, it is also important to be flexible about the bank you choose, as some banks may be busier than others and you **may only get an appointment to open your account after a month**, while other banks have available appointment slots immediately (depending on the crowds at each branch at that time)

## Steps:

### 1. Booking an appointment

- After choosing a bank, book an appointment with the nearest branch to your campus or accommodation IMMEDIATELY after you arrive (to minimize long waits for your appointment). You can do so via walk-ins or online booking.

# Opening A Bank Account (UK)

- While making your appointment, ask for the list of necessary documents to set up an account, as it may be different from bank to bank. Especially with regards to whom they would like the "**Confirmation of Study**" letter to be addressed to, and how your name should be shown (especially Chinese names) since each bank requires a different format. Also, do ask if they need a Proof of Accommodation, especially if you're staying in a private accommodation – which will be given to you by your landlord/property agent.
- Try different branches to find sooner appointments if the next available appointment slot is not suitable.
- Note that Confirmation of Study letters are only available after a certain date (usually a week before Freshers Week), hence you can only start opening an account after then.

## 2. Preparing required documents

- Documents definitely required: Passport and 'Confirmation of Study' letter.
- Either request the 'Confirmation of Study' letter during registration or from the King's "Compass". The Compass booth can be found in the libraries of the following campuses: Strand (Maughan), Waterloo, Guy's and Denmark Hill
- Have the letter addressed to the bank of your choice. Ensure that your Confirmation of Study letter has your flat and room number in the address line, as banks can be very insistent on this, and would avoid unnecessary hassle.

# Opening A Bank Account (UK)

## 3. The Appointment

- Turn up on the date of appointment with all the required documents. The bank staff will guide you through the rest. If possible, do get the email address of the staff who processed your application, in case you need to liaise with him/her subsequently.

## PROS

- No need to deposit a minimum sum in the bank.
- Local banks *may* have better interest than HSBC.
- Avoid the tedious process of setting up a HSBC account remotely from Singapore.

## CONS

- Have to bring a large sum of cash to London. (Alternatively, you can get your parents to transfer you money from Singapore (ask your bank how), but you will have to pay extra charges)
- The wait for the earliest appointment date ranges between a few days to a month. Upon completion of the appointment and submission of documents, the debit card will take another few days (usually less than 7) to reach you.



# Opening A Bank Account (UK)

## Monzo

Many people also open a Monzo account in addition to their main bank accounts as it is very useful for holiday spending and tracking expenses. Monzo is a digital online bank where you set up your account solely via your smart phone.

- It offers extremely good exchange rates and can be used on holiday to save the hassle of exchanging currencies.
- The mobile app has a very comprehensive expenses tracker that summarizes your budget and expenditure.
- Can easily 'monzo' money to friends without the need for bank account details via the mobile app (equivalent of paylah/paynow)
- While there are no physical branches, there is customer service in-app or on call available 24/7/365.
- While you may doubt the legitimacy of an online bank when you first hear of it, Monzo is safe and secure as it is a regulated bank insured under the Financial Services Compensation Scheme (FSCS).

If the appointment to open your main bank account (Barclays, HSBC, etc) is taking very long, you could consider getting a monzo account in the mean time as it comes with a debit card.



# Opening A Bank Account (UK)

## DBS Multicurrency account/ Youtrip

By opening a **multicurrency account with DBS**, you are able to convert your SGD to GBP within the account at good rates, allowing for both currencies to exist in your account.

This allows you to spend money when you first enter the UK without any foreign transaction fees while waiting for your UK bank account to be set up.

**Youtrip** is a multicurrency mobile travel wallet that works on the same principle and comes with a mastercard that allows you to spend without foreign transaction costs. It may also potentially be easier to setup as you simply need to transfer funds from your bank account into your youtrip wallet.

# Getting A Mobile Plan

When in London, remember to turn off the roaming on your Singapore mobile plan. Even without 4G, there are plenty of free Wifi networks for you to tap on. This will be sufficient for you to last the next few days until you have decided on a mobile plan - which can either be pay-as-you-go, or a monthly contract.

Alternatively, UCAS may send GiffGaff/Voxi SIM cards that you can activate from Singapore and buy a cheap temporary plan.

Here are some of the major telecom providers that most of us are on:

- Common Plans: 4GB for £12/month, 8GB for £15/month
- Pros: Flexible rolling plans, able to cancel anytime, Plan includes roaming in EU, Easily obtainable (from UCAS, ordering online)
- Cons: No physical stores
- Most start with it and switch providers once settling down

- Common Plans: Monthly contract: 12GB for £20/month, 4GB for £16/month ; Yearly contract: 12GB for £14/month
- Pros: Cheap deals via their app "Wuntu", Plan includes roaming for 71 destinations including Singapore, GoBinge (Using snapchat and netflix does not use up your data)
- Cons: If you get a yearly plan, you have to pay over summer (But since roaming covers Singapore, many people just use their UK numbers back home and cancel their Singapore number)

- Pros: Flexible rolling plans (similar to GiffGaff), Plan includes roaming in EU, Unlimited social media usage, SIM easily obtainable (via UCAS or ordering online)

- Cons: No physical stores

- Voxi is a sub-brand of Vodafone and customer service can be done through their hotlines.

- Some mobile providers may offer student promotions, especially when Freshers start arriving, so do keep an eye out for these!
- This list is not exhaustive and is limited to our knowledge. There are a lot of other mobile plans you could choose from such as Virgin Media, 1p, Plusnet mobile, etc. These are just some plans that most of us have experience with. Do your own research to figure out which plan works for you!

Other notes:

- Unlike Singapore, London's mobile signal connectivity is much weaker. As such, there is no connection in the tube and often poor connection in some buildings.
- Tube: Users of Virgin Media, EE, Vodafone (including Voxi), O2 or Three are able to connect to wifi at tube stations for free (note: only at tube stations and not on trains)

# Shopping and Expenses

## Using Cash and Bank Cards

**Cashpoints (ATMs)** are pretty common in London. You will usually be able to use your bank card to draw money at any cashpoint, even if it is not your bank's ATM, free of charge. i.e. if you hold a HSBC debit card, you can draw money from a Lloyd's cashpoint for free. Do take note that some third-party cashpoints charge for withdrawals, so keep a lookout and avoid those. It will usually be stated above the machine, and on the screen before you put in your card.

Most places in London accept both cash and your debit card. Most places also have **contactless payment**. Contactless payment is the more common payment option in the UK, owing to the immense weight and number of coins and sheer convenience of the contactless system. You may even find yourself paying for pennies worth of stuff with your card. Another thing that is common in the UK is **splitting the bill** at the point of payment. When eating with friends, and to avoid the hassle of owing each other money, the bill can be split, either equally or by dish at the point of payment. This is done by telling the cashier how much you are paying. This works both with payments with cash or by card.

## Tips on Saving Money!

King's has a handy budget planner and a forecaster to help you better manage your money. MoneySavingExpert is also rather helpful.

Unidays and VoucherCodes are some places where you can find discounts and offers for various stores, which will help you save some money.

Websites like Student Money Saver and Save The Student are also updated regularly with available freebies and good discounts.

# Shopping and Expenses

## Common Expenses in London

### *Tuition Fees*

Ensure that you have a sufficient amount to pay your course fees for your entire stay in London. Fees are due biannually, once in November and in January. The deposit paid would be used to offset the amount due from you for your Tuition Fees. It should be reflected as such on your Student Portal. Do check out King's Fees and Funding page for details on your tuition fees.

### *Accommodation*

If you have decided on a student accommodation, the respective halls should have informed you of the fees prior to your accommodation application. The cost of private accommodations differs depending on the location and size of the residences. Prices range from £630-£1,700 per month. Do also remember to have sufficient money to pay the security deposit and rent of your accommodation for the next academic year. Most private accommodations require you to place a security deposit in advance, as well 6 months of rent upfront, unless you have a UK guarantor.

### *Moving-in*

When you first move-in and unpack, you may want to purchase additions to your room for functional purposes or just to make your room feel more home-y.

### *Transportation*

Depending on where you stay and how frequently you will have to travel, the amount of money that you will spend on public transport can range from £20-£120 per month (or even £0 if you decide to walk/cycle!)

# Shopping and Expenses

## *Holidays*

You are living in the heart of Europe and there are countless destinations that you can conveniently visit, so many that there is barely any space to list all of them down. Do remember to set aside a considerable amount of money (including Euros) for your travels in the year ahead. Consider getting cards such as Monzo which saves you the hassle of exchanging currency!

## *Eating Out*

An average meal in a cafe/restaurant in London costs about £5-£15 depending on where and what you eat.

## *Cooking In*

It costs much less to make yourself a meal with groceries that you have purchased, which roughly comes up to about £1-£5 per meal.

## *Phone Bills (refer to mobile plans section)*

You can choose from a wide range of different plans from different carriers here in London and average monthly phone bills (including all basic services) come up to about £10-£15 per month.

## *Laundry*


The cost of laundry services differs from accommodation to accommodation, but an average student spends about £10 on laundry per month.

# Shopping and Expenses

## Grocery Shopping

Grocery shopping is an important life skill, and it is relatively convenient. Larger supermarket chains like Tesco and Sainsbury's have smaller convenience stores (Tesco Express/Sainsbury Local) that are everywhere, as well as larger supermarkets with a greater range of products. Note that groceries are usually slightly cheaper at the bigger stores.

This pyramid ranks common UK supermarkets by price.



# Shopping and Expenses

## Buying Furniture/Household Items

You should not need to buy large furniture items if you are living in student accommodations, but if you need things like a lamp, sleeping bag or kitchen items, head to **Argos** (order stuff online/ their nifty iPad in store) or **Ikea**. London's Ikea's are far out in zone 4/5 though, so take that into consideration, especially if you plan to buy many/heavy items.

If you do not want to bring them from Singapore, bed linen/duvets/pillows can be bought from **Primark** (lower quality but cheaper) or department stores like **John Lewis**.

## Amazon Prime!

Students are given 6 months free trial on Amazon Prime (which offers next day or even same day delivery depending on what time of the day you order your item)

This is ideal for buying any random things you suddenly find yourself needing.... Like a box of 40 packs of Indomie...

TOP TIP: Share your Amazon account amongst your friends so you none of you have to pay at all during your time in London. For example, you can share the first account and then after the first 6 months, switch over to another friend's account. Rinse and repeat!

## Buying Clothes

Primark is pretty decent if you're looking for functional items. For fashionistas, try Vintage markets near Liverpool Street. They're cheaper and sometimes you can get one-of-a-kind branded goods for more than a 50% discount! If you are into thrifting, there are many thrift stores around London too!

# Useful Mobile Applications



## Citymapper

Citymapper is a lifesaver! It shows prices (important as taking the bus then train incurs separate charges), and where on the platform to board trains, which Google Maps does not do.



## Tube Map

Useful when you are underground with no data, as this app works offline. It also provides a journey planner for the tube and tells you the status of each tube line.



## Trainline

Search for Rail services across different rail companies and book them easily with this app! Especially important for travelling outside London



## King's Mobile

Contains timetables, a link to KEATS, campus maps, etc









